For the 2016-17 school year, schools were identified using new definitions and labels as required in the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA). A Targeted Support and Improvement (TSI) school is one that has at least one underperforming student subgroup. An Additional Targeted Support (ATS) school is one that has three or more underperforming student subgroups. A Comprehensive Support and Improvement (CSI) school is one whose performance is in the lowest 5% of all schools in the state. Some schools are not identified with any of these labels. In these cases, no label is given.

Our school has not been given one of these labels.

Prior to the beginning of the school year, grade level teams developed plans based on Spring NWEA results as well as 2017 preliminary M-Step scores. Weekly team planning sessions are planned to make necessary adjustments to lessons and assessments. Students who are At-Risk will continue to receive intervention services throughout the day and have opportunities for after school tutoring. We will utilize AIMS Web as the core program for the students in the intervention program. In addition, staff will utilize the intervention content in the new reading intervention tools such as Reading Mastery and Corrective Reading. In each grade level, an Academic Specialist or paraprofessional will provide intervention services in reading and math. A focus on reading instruction is evident in grades K-3. All instructional staff will continue utilizing M-Step and NWEA data to differentiate instruction to continue to focus on improving the quality of instruction.

1. PROCESS FOR ASSIGNING PUPILS TO THE SCHOOL

2016-2017

Linden Charter Academy is a state-funded, public school academy. Therefore, there is no cost to attend the Academy. The school is open to any child wishing to attend. Students must be age-appropriate for their respective grade, and they must reside in the state of Michigan.


By law, the school cannot restrict enrollment based on selection criteria. The school can, however, limit the total number of students who may attend the school. If the number of applications exceeds the number of offered seats, a random selection process will determine who attends the school.

The school's Open Enrollment period begins on the first day of the current school year and ends at 5 p.m. on the last day of business in February of the current school year. During this Open Enrollment period, all applications receive equal consideration regardless of the date submitted. At the close of Open Enrollment, all applications received during the Open Enrollment period will be counted. If applications received are fewer than offered seats in each and every grade level, all applicants will be accepted and will receive a notice of acceptance into their respective grades. If the number of applications received exceeds the number of offered seats in any grade level, a random selection process will take place for all affected grade levels. Names are randomly selected until all offered seats have been filled. Any remaining names are selected to establish waiting list priority. Applications received after the Open Enrollment period will be accepted until the end of the current school year and available seats will be filled.

Once students are Enrolled and remain Enrolled, they will remain eligible to be Re-Enrolled at the school for successive years without having to re-apply. However, they will be requested to complete a re-enrollment form by the end of the Open Enrollment period showing their intent to Re-Enroll for the subsequent school year. All applicants on a waiting list must submit an application for the following school year during the next Open Enrollment period.

In an effort to accommodate parents who have more than one child eligible for enrollment, siblings of accepted and currently Enrolled students are given enrollment priority over children who have no such siblings. Siblings of currently Enrolled students at the school will be drawn first in the random selection process, if one is necessary, for offered seats. In addition, if a child is selected during the random selection process, that child's sibling will be offered an available offered seat or the next spot on the waiting list in his/her respective grade. Though siblings are afforded priority for offered seats, they are not given priority over a previously Enrolled student.

In addition to sibling preference, children of staff members employed at the school working a regularly scheduled minimum of 20 hours per week (at least 0.5 FTE) or children of current



board members are given enrollment priority. Though these children are afforded priority for offered seats, they are not given priority over a sibling, or a previously Enrolled student.

All applications received after the Open Enrollment Period will not be eligible to participate in the random selection process, and will be added to the end of the accepted list if offered seats are still available after the random selection process, or to the resulting waiting list created at the time of the random selection process.

A. Describe how data led your School Improvement Team to select your school's improvement objectives in the core academic curriculum

The school's School Improvement Team reviews data formally and informally throughout each school year as part of its continuous school improvement process. In spring 2017, the school reviewed school and student performance data and perceptual data aligned with the Michigan School Improvement Framework. This review included the following data, among others:

- Student achievement on norm-referenced assessments, including Northwest Evaluation Association's (NWEA) Primary Grades Assessment and Measures of Academic Progress (MAP), criterion-referenced assessments (state assessment), and classroom assessments
- Student demographics
- Discipline, tardy, truancy, and attendance rates
- Parent surveys
- Staff surveys and teacher quality information
- Programs and processes Data

As a result of the School Improvement Team's review of data, priority improvement objectives in the core academic curriculum were selected for the upcoming school year.




B. Describe your implementation plan for the core academic improvement objectives identified in your school improvement process. You may choose to describe your overall curricular implementation plan or you may choose to describe the plan in each content area

The School Improvement Team completed a comprehensive needs assessment by reviewing available data, including criterion and norm referenced data. The data was the primary driver for the School Improvement Team's decision-making process. All goals, strategies, action activities, professional development and parent and community involvement decisions documented in the School Improvement Plan were driven by the needs assessment. Based upon the data reviewed by Linden's School Improvement Team, it was determined that our current focus needs to be on science and social studies, as well as continuing to grow our teachers in common core standard implementation in mathematics and language arts in order to meet the needs of our students. Through continued professional development in all of the aforementioned subject areas, teachers will continue to learn and enhance their teaching. Teachers will stay informed of curriculum alignment in all core subject areas and seek supplemental materials to take learning to a higher level. Data indicates that all of the aforementioned strategies will be enhanced by changes in instructional processes as well, including professional development, professional support, instructional sequence plan, scoring scales, formative assessment strategies, professional learning communities, standard based lesson plans where teachers completely moved to the Common Core in 2013-2014, and grade level meetings to examine student work. In addition to this, teachers will involve students in standards tracking in the classroom to become familiar with targeted skills and learning gaps. The School Improvement Plan process was similar to the process last year by ensuring the use of a comprehensive needs assessment. The purpose of creating a building level decision-making process for Linden Charter Academy is to utilize consensus as a measure of acceptance and assertion.

C. Did the SIP do what it set out to do? Describe the evaluation process that led you to this conclusion.

The School Improvement Plan at Linden Charter Academy has been a living document and the success of it has been evidenced by increased test scores. Factors of this increase are literacy-based professional development and the commitment to writing in all content areas. A greater focus on data and targeting students in need of improvement by using differentiated instruction have also played a role in Linden's success. The School Improvement Plan has allowed us to identify the needs of our students, school and community to make educated, data-based decisions that allows Linden Charter Academy to continue to soar. This was done through small group instruction with our intervention staff and classroom teachers utilizing a "workshop" approach to small group instruction that delivered stronger results in student academic achievement as demonstrated on our NWEA test results. Other specific data evaluated includes that collected through M-Step assessments, NWEA assessments, summative assessments and formative assessments. The evaluation process includes ascertaining the degree to which each goal has been met or what progress has been made toward each goal.



Our student learning results have demonstrated improvement across the building due to our focused efforts. On the state assessments, we outperform our local school district (Flint) in nearly every area tested by the state of Michigan.

The School Improvement Team formally reviewed progress against its 2016-17 SIP goals and objectives in spring 2017, as part of its preparation for the 2017-18 school year. A review of student performance data and other data pertaining to the school's selected focus area was conducted in order to evaluate progress toward meeting its goals. Specific data evaluated includes that collected through the state assessment, NWEA assessments, summative assessments, and formative assessments. The evaluation process includes ascertaining the degree to which each goal has been met or what progress has been made toward each goal.

D. Describe how the evaluation of data and the current year's school improvement process led your school improvement team to select your school's improvement objectives in the core academic curriculum for the next school year

See A and C above. Additionally, the School Improvement Team's evaluation of data, as part of its continuous school improvement process, revealed key focus areas for improvement. Identified through the process were specific student performance targets in English language arts, mathematics, science, and social studies.

E. How was this year's school improvement process similar or different from last year's process?

On the whole, this year's school improvement process was similar to last year's process. The School Improvement Team met formally in the spring both to evaluate progress against the prior year's identified school improvement goals and to assess data and identify school improvement goals for the next year.

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3. A BRIEF DESCRIPTION OF EACH SPECIALIZED SCHOOL

2016-2017

Linden Charter Academy is authorized by Central Michigan University. The school was founded in 1999 and is a member of National Heritage Academies. As a state-funded public school academy, Linden offers a tuition free education to students. We serve over 700 students. Linden Charter Academy serves students from four different school districts. About 85% of our students are residents of the city of Flint. We currently offer grades kindergarten through eighth




grade. We also offer four classrooms in Kindergarten and three classrooms first through eighth grade of about 28 students per class. Approximately 96% of the student body is African American and nearly 92% of the population is eligible for free/reduced price lunch. Free and reduced lunch has increased over the past three years. Another trend we noted was that the percent of Caucasians over three years has decreased, while the percentage of African Americans has increased. We noticed academic performance has increased in many areas of state testing, particularly in fifth and eighth grade. Data shows that about half of our teachers have less than three years of experience. We have noted stabilization in teacher turnover after making adjustments during the school year this year. We offer full Special Education services including: speech, occupational therapy, resource room, physical therapy, and social work. Our Special Education students represent 23.3% of our total school population. Academics are the priority for students at Linden Charter Academy; however, the school's stakeholders believe that values are fundamental to a great education and an integral part of the curriculum. As such, the school has a Moral Focus curriculum. As part of the Moral Focus curriculum, students focus on a different virtue each month. Though the virtue is common across the whole school each month, each grade level examines each virtue from a slightly different perspective. Linden Charter Academy's monthly virtues schedules is as follows: September - Wisdom, October - Respect, November - Gratitude, December - Self-Control, January - Perseverance, February - Courage, March -Encouragement, April - Compassion, and May - Integrity.

Linden Vision Statement: To better educate more children

Linden Mission Statement: Working in cooperation with families, staff, and the community, Linden Charter Academy offers a strong curriculum, focused on character education in a nurturing atmosphere of high, yet attainable, academic and moral expectations for our increasingly diverse student population. Students master basic skills while strengthening their moral foundation in preparation for life-long learning.

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4. IDENTIFY HOW TO ACCESS A COPY OF THE CORE CURRICULUM, A DESCRIPTION OF ITS IMPLEMENTATION AND AN EXPLANATION OF THE VARIANCES FROM THE STATE'S MODEL

Our goal of preparing students for college success has required us to take a unique view in terms of our curriculum. Our goal is to graduate students who have not only had the opportunity to experience academic excellence, but have acquired the knowledge and skills necessary to be successful in high school and college. What makes our curriculum particularly unique is that it has been developed to support state standards with a college-bound approach.

Our curriculum was developed based on the analysis of standards and assessment experts across the nation, including groups such as National Assessment of Educational Progress (NAEP), ACT®, Achieve, Inc., the Thomas B. Fordham Institute, the National Council of Teachers of English, The National Mathematics Advisory Panel, the American Association for the Advancement of Science, and the National Council for Social Studies. This analysis, conducted by National Heritage Academies, comprehensively researched what students need



to know to be successfully prepared for rigorous high school and college educational programming. NHA then worked backward to develop a curriculum that defines the expertise needed by students in kindergarten through eighth grade to enter high school on the path to college readiness. Since college readiness goes beyond academic preparedness, the curriculum not only includes learning goals in core academic and co-curricular areas, but also includes an integrated character development component.

The curriculum's objectives are aligned to those identified by the Michigan Academic Standards: both the Common Core State Standards (CCSS) and the Grade Level Content Expectations (GLCE). Moreover, all students are expected to reach the CCSS and GLCE goals. However, modifications/accommodations are sometimes necessary to ensure learning for all students. This support comes through classroom differentiation, in-class support services, targeted programmatic resources, out of class intervention, and out of school time opportunities—all of which are designed to accelerate student growth trajectories.


The only variance in our curriculum when compared to the Michigan Academic Standards is the addition of a Moral Focus component. We believe great schools develop both a student's heart and mind, and the Moral Focus program is designed to support parents' efforts to teach character at home by reinforcing and modeling universal human virtues, such as compassion, respect, and integrity. This Moral Focus program is explicit and integrated with the school's core curriculum. A different virtue is featured each month of the school year. Teachers model behavior that exemplifies the virtue and recognize and praise students when they do the same.

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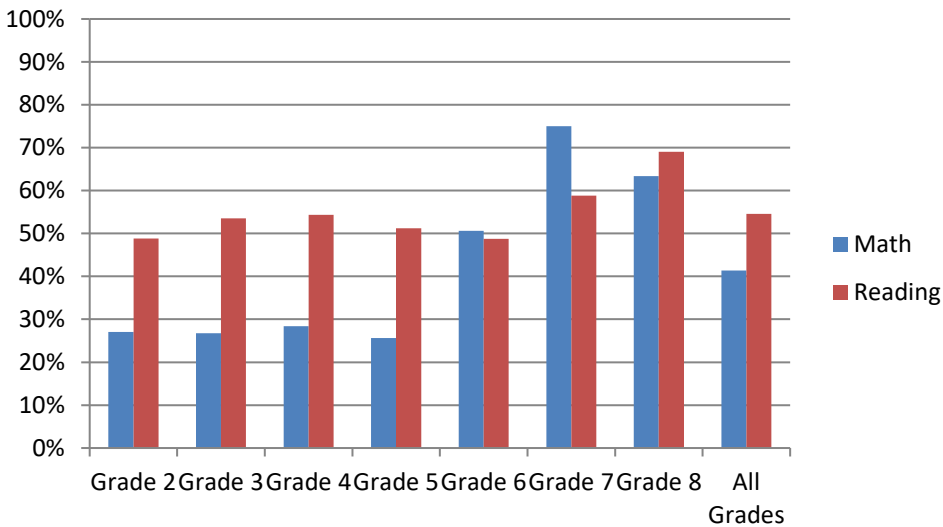

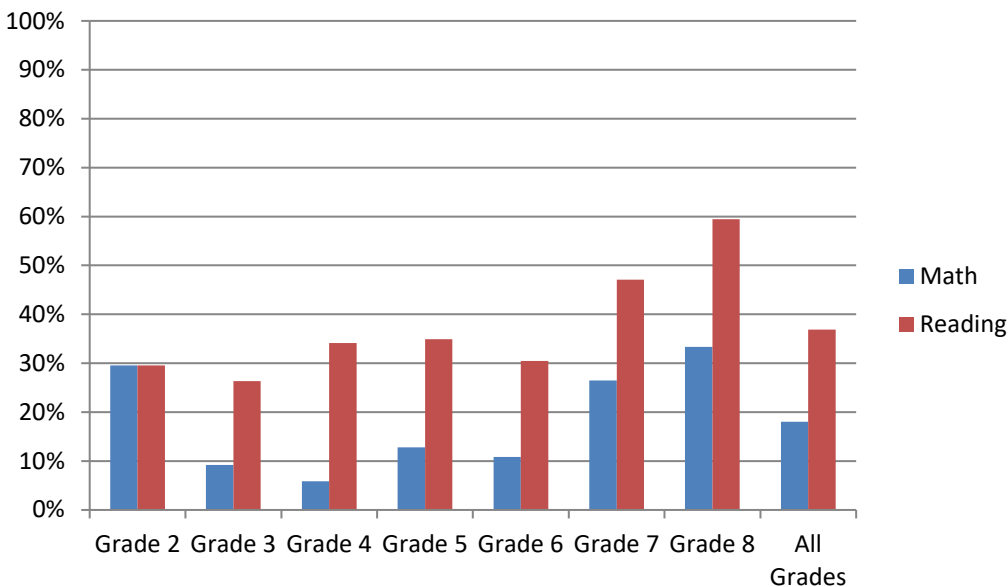

Detailed below is a graph depicting the percentage of students in our school meeting growth targets from fall 2016 to spring 2017.

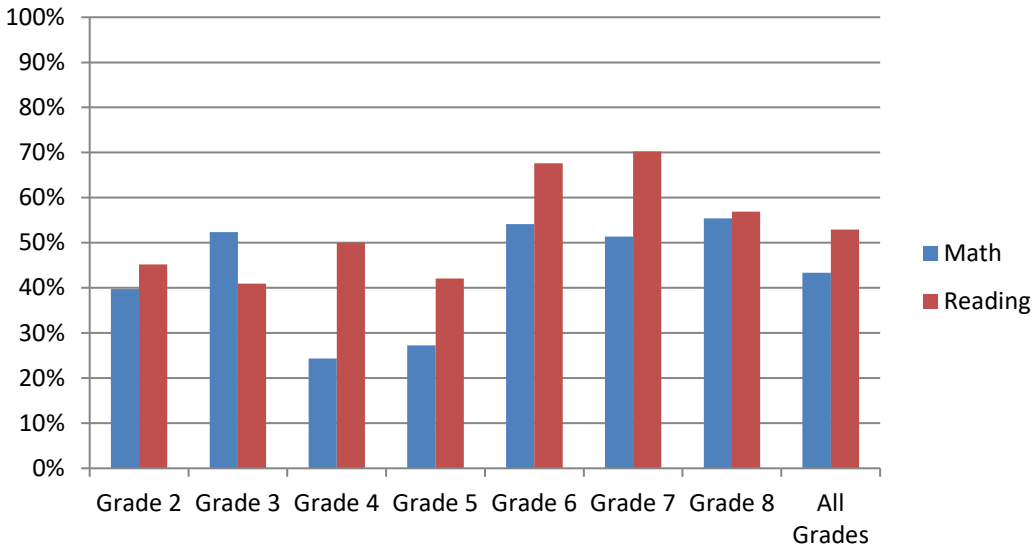


Detailed below are the percentages of students performing at or above the 50th percentile on the spring 2017 administration of the NWEA MAP assessment.

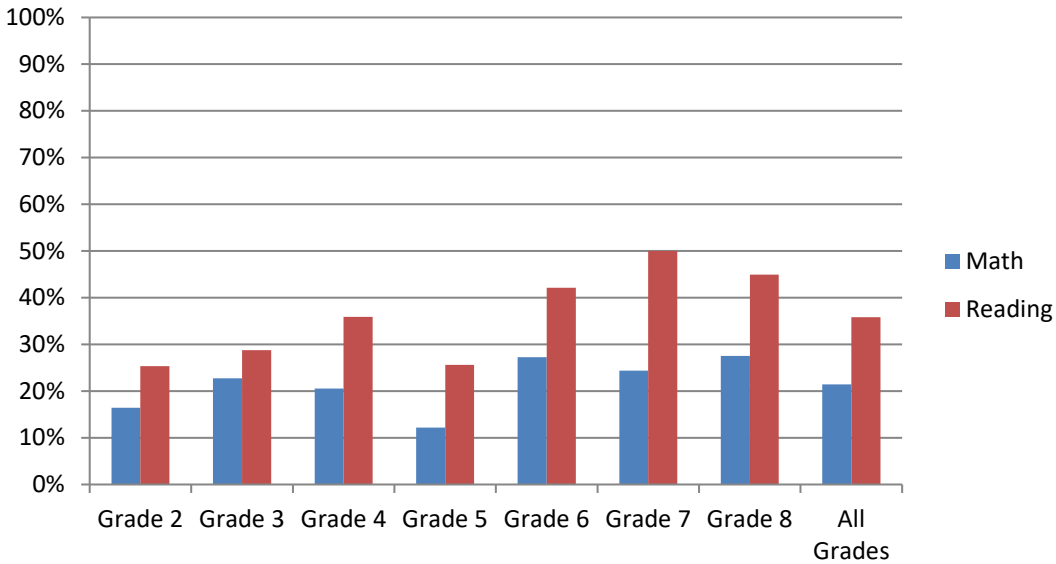

7. SCHOOL YEAR HIGHLIGHTS

- Intervention and Small Group Instruction – Based on the low scores in academic areas based on NWEA and state test data, Linden implemented workshop at all grade levels in order to better meet the needs of individual students in the lowest quarter of academic achievement. Professional Development has been ongoing and sustained throughout the school year to ensure best practice.
- Cranbrook Institute of Science – Visits from the institute instructors allowed students to participate in a number of hands-on experiments and stations exploring earth science, physical science, electricity and chemistry during the school day.
- Community Partnerships – Students donated funds to American Red Cross, Leukemia and Lymphoma Foundation, the American Cancer Society, and our school “Angel Tree”. Our National Junior Honors Society also was involved in serving opportunities in our community.
- Summer Learning – Our intervention staff has developed a ‘boot camp’ for our incoming Kindergarten students. This learning opportunity will focus on early literacy skills and reading for our students. We will also focus on our rising 2nd – 7th grade students’ fluency and comprehension skills.
- Publishing Parties – Each classroom conducts two publishing parties each year. Students work on a piece of writing which is taken through the entire writing process and then displayed in the hallway with their picture. Parents are invited into the classroom to hear their student’s writings and enjoy refreshments.

We are looking forward to another rewarding and successful school year in 2018-19!
