What is my child learning at school? How can a parent review these materials?	Every school in North Carolina must follow the Standard Course of Study, determined by the State Board of Education. These guidelines outline the knowledge and skills that students are expected to know by the end of each grade/course. How will a parent learn about my child's progress in school or with a class?	Greensboro Academy believes that open communication between school and home improves the quality of the educational experience. Every marking period, parents receive detailed written reports of student performance and accomplishments. These reports are coupled with fall and spring parent-teacher conferences. The reports and conferences include interpretation of internal and external measures of assessment. Teachers and parents may also schedule additional meetings. At all other times throughout the year, parents can use the Parent Portal via the internet to view their child's grades and progress. 	<u>Local assessments</u> Quarterly report cards which detail grades, attendance, and assessment are distributed as specified in the school calendar. Parents can access and monitor their child's progress in school, obtain information on assessment results, and more through the Parent Portal. For assistance with Parent Portal, parents may contact the school. <u>State Assessments</u> Individual Student Reports for end-of-grade/course tests and other state assessments (English language proficiency assessment) are accessible in Greensboro's Parent Portal. In NC, all students take end-of-grade assessments for reading and math in grades 3-8. Students take end-of-grade science assessments in grades 5 and 8. North Carolina's Department of Public Instruction (NCDPI) selected mCLASS DIBELS® 8th Edition as the state's K-3 Literacy Assessment. mCLASS is an integrated literacy system based on the Science of Reading.

How can a parent help their child learn and make progress?	Greensboro parents are asked to sign the School-Parent Compact, which outlines how the parents, the entire school staff, and the students will share the responsibility for improved student academic achievement and the means by which the school and parents will build and develop a partnership that will help children achieve the State’s high standards. This includes: • Understanding that your child is enrolled at Greensboro Academy, so he/she has opportunities to achieve. • Realizing that the expectations and standards at this school are high and agreeing to support them. • Monitoring your child’s attendance and homework completion. • Participating in parent-teacher conferences and volunteering for school activities when possible. • Staying informed about your child’s education and communicating with the school by promptly reading all notices from the school either received by your child or by mail and responding, as appropriate. • Serving, to the extent possible, on policy advisory groups, such as being a Title I, Part A parent representative on the school’s School Improvement Team, or other school advisory or policy groups.



	• Understanding that your child must behave respectfully and responsibly to protect the safety, interest, and rights of others in the school. Parents should model appropriate behavior while in the school. Here are additional ways that you can support your student: • Prioritize routines and structure at home on school nights. • Arrive at school on time. How can a parent help their child develop citizenship, social skills, and respect for others?	We believe that a strong moral identity is foundational to student success. We strive not only to support the virtues parents try to instill at home but also to explicitly teach students the skills, behaviors, and virtues necessary for leading an ethical life. Greensboro's nine monthly virtues are <i>wisdom, respect, gratitude, self-control, perseverance, courage, encouragement, compassion, and integrity</i>. Students learn to internalize these virtues because we intentionally and consistently apply Moral Focus concepts throughout all aspects of school life. This integration is essential for students to learn the importance of developing and maintaining strong personal character. To support this effort, we create a learning environment built on a foundation of



	respect and care, a milieu in which everyone works hard to achieve academic goals and improve school culture. The Moral Focus program is an essential part of every student's education. The expectation is that all students are able to define, provide examples, and live out the Moral Focus virtues in all areas of their lives. At home, you can support by reviewing the virtues, definitions, and examples as well as finding ways to exhibit those expectations at home. Having a reward system, tracking positive Moral Focus behaviors, not only in your home, but also in your community, will prove to be extremely beneficial. Creating space and opportunity for this is key. Showing your child the value of living these out in all areas of life will encourage your child to lead an ethical life. Additional ways you can support your child in developing citizenship, social skills, and respect for others include: • Utilize the parent resources sent home each month to reinforce the Moral Focus Virtue of the Month. • Be a role model for your scholar.
How can I help establish high expectations for my child's success in school?	Our school provides a rigorous college-prep education and a strong moral focus program. Our goal is for students to develop the knowledge, skills, and moral strength they need to succeed in college, work, and life. In addition to preparing our students for academic success, we seek to develop a strong sense of responsibility in each child. We want students to take personal ownership of their success or failure, regardless of their background or previous experiences. This includes sound decision-making, an ability that is becoming critical in our ever-changing, complex world. Students must meet high expectations both academically and behaviorally. Our teachers work with students and parents to promote the responsibility necessary for success both in and out of school. Strengthening a child's realization of high expectations and fostering a commitment to lifelong learning involves creating a supportive and motivating environment.



	We believe that open communication between school and home improves the quality of the educational experience. Parents and family members of students are vital contributors in the education of their children. The school will ensure that all parents/guardians are involved in our school in a meaningful manner in order to improve student academic achievement. Two-way communication between the school and home, both verbal and written, provides a sound base for a good partnership to provide an effective educational program for all students. Full realization of the partnership will be achieved through on-going commitment and active participation by both home and school. Every marking period, parents receive detailed written reports of student performance and accomplishments. These reports are coupled with fall and spring parent-teacher conferences. The reports and conferences include interpretation of internal and external measures of assessment. Teachers and parents may also schedule additional meetings. At all other times throughout the year, parents can use Greensboro's Secure School Website via the Internet to view their child's grades and progress. This web-based information center provides parents with both classroom information and student academic data. The Secure School Website promotes the increased accountability of all participants in the educational process—teachers, students, and parents.
How can a parent strengthen communication with the school/teacher?	Effective communication between the school and home is vital to the successful academic, emotional, and social well-being of students. To keep parents informed of school events and student growth, the school communicates often with parents through email newsletters, telephone calls, and individual and group meetings. Greensboro Academy uses a range of events and communications vehicles to share information with parents and give them opportunities to offer feedback. This includes: • <i>Newsletters:</i> The school publishes a newsletter for families to provide updates on current events and programmatic developments. • <i>Social Media:</i> The school maintains a strong, user-friendly website to give parents access to information on the school and on their children's experience at the school. The school also takes advantage of Facebook and Instagram, with the goal of further strengthening connections among school leaders, teachers, and family members.



- *Classroom Communication:* Teachers regularly give students information to take home to their parents. Examples include weekly updates and take-home folders with classroom-specific information. Teachers also give parents regular reports on their students' progress using letters, online communications, phone calls, texts, and/or face-to-face meetings.
- *Parent Meetings:* The school regularly schedules parent information sessions so parents can learn what their students are doing and learning in school. In addition, the teachers conduct parent teacher conferences to discuss student's academic progress with parents.
- *Parent Portal:* In addition to using the online Parent Portal to access their child's academic information, families can also use it as a resource for many uses including filling out forms, emailing their children's teachers, receiving important notifications, adding funds to lunch accounts, and viewing information about school events.
- *SchoolConnect:* The school utilizes SchoolConnect to provide families with important school information including upcoming events, school closures, etc.
- *Family Nights:* We schedule various social and educational events during the school year to strengthen relationships among students, parents, teachers, and administrators.
- *Parent Survey:* Each fall and spring, the school conducts a parent satisfaction survey to gather feedback from parents.

Greensboro Academy is a charter school. Charter schools are public schools of choice that are authorized by the State Board of Education and operated by independent non-profit boards of directors. State and local tax dollars are the primary funding sources for charter schools, which have open enrollment and cannot discriminate in admissions, associate with any religion or religious group, or charge-tuition.

Influenza is a virus spread from infected persons to the nose or throat of another. Influenza can cause fever, sore throat, chills, coughs, headache, and muscle aches. A yearly vaccination is available.

Meningococcal disease is a serious illness caused by bacteria. It is an infection of the brain and spinal cord coverings and can cause blood infections. The vaccine for this is required for individuals entering 7th grade or by the age of 12.
